BILL SUMMARY

Synopsis: Senate Bill 484 requires that any person assigned to an intensive supervision program also be enrolled in a behavioral health program, and that evidence-based behavioral health treatment programs be incrementally incorporated into intensive supervision programs. Senate Bill 484 also requires the corrections department to use a validated risk and needs assessment in determining the appropriate treatment for inmates assigned to prison programs.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

SIGNIFICANT ISSUES

Senate Bill 484 requires that each individual placed in an intensive supervision program necessarily be enrolled in a behavioral health program, but also requires that the corrections department use a validated risk and needs assessment for all inmates. There may be situations when the validated risk and needs assessment does not indicate the need for behavioral health services.
